Ethics: Best Choices



Why is Ethics training important?

We work with one of the most vulnerable groups in society...children. Because our work affects children's lives we need to make sure we are making choices based on professional ethics, using a thoughtful decision making process. When we are thoughtful in our practice we make informed decisions rather than quick ones which contributes to a positive early childhood experience. Positive early childhood experiences help all children to learn and grow to their potential.

What is an ethical practice?

Ethics are the "rules" that govern our lives and help us to make decisions. Some of these rules are personal and make us who we are as individuals, such as The Golden Rule – treat others as you would have them treat you. Others are shared by society as a whole, or groups within our society. In our case, we have the MCCA Code of Ethics – eight principles intended to guide early childhood educators in deciding what is the best choice. Ethical practice involves the ability to see ethical components in a decision, reflect on your own beliefs and values, and use a decision-making framework.

Sound difficult? Not when you break it down!

About the Best Choices - The Ethical Journey Workshop Series
